For beauty of model, excellence of materials, and finished workmanship, the Frontier is pronounced by our best judges to have had no superior, if equal, among the many fine vessels that have been built in this place and vicinity. She was completely sparred and rigged, and in a manner which does great credit to the taste and judgment of her experienced master, and glided into her destined element in fine style amid the admiring gaze of a small number of spectators, the greater part of our citizens being disappointed of so grand a sight, in consequence of her being launched previous to the time generally understood and before high water. She is owned by S. Wheeler, the Master, messrs Hayden & Kilby, and C. Peavey, and is 194 tons.

LARGE WEN.—This week, a Wen, weighing Seven Pounds, was taken from the right breast of L. F. DELSEBURNER, Esq. of Lubec, now in the 73d year of his age. The operation was performed by Doctor AYER, of this place, in about five minutes. The tumor had been of more than twenty years standing, and from its great size and a recently ulcerated state was fast wearing upon the health of the patient. The wound is now rapidly healing, and will probably be perfectly well in a few days—indeed, he has not been confined to the house a single day, and is now able to take his usual walks. We mention this circumstance as we do not recollect of ever hearing before of so large a Wen being amputated, and with a view, also, to encourage others who are afflicted with those troublesome protuberances, to submit to an operation, but are restrained, through fear, from having them removed, when in fact no danger need be apprehended if the operation is performed by skillful hands.
