Report of the Superintendent of Schools

of the Town of Robbinston, for the year ending, March 31, 1913.

FELLOW CITIZENS:—I hereby submit the following Annual port for the Schools. The same Report covers both the ne of service of Miss Edith J. Gerry, who resigned because contemplated absence from town, as well as for the Winterm, during which I completed her term of appointment.

As regards financial conditions, I refer you to the fuller attement elsewhere recorded. I give here only such facts deserve special attention. For comparison:

These accounts were over-run largely because of exceptionly reduced appropriations the preceding year, and thus me accounts ran over onto this year. The Common thools account was over-run partly for said reason, and rtly because I was not aware of a cut in this years' appropriation. In the expenditures for text books \$29, and for ition \$40, are liabilities from the preceding year.

As regards buildings, much might be done to make them ore wholesome and sanitary. Some of the teachers, trough their own personal efforts, by means of school enter-

tainments, have raised the means for providing some needed maps, etc.

The schools in all districts were kept for 34 weeks, save for the Village school, which lost eight weeks, because of diphtheria. The policy recommended by the State authorities, of rigid quarantine, thorough fumigation, and as regular sessions of the school, as necessary precautions would permit, finally proved to be the better policy, under such trying circumstances.

Because of exposure to infection it was necessary that a number of text books be destroyed. All text books, as fast as practicable, are being repaired, labeled, numbered and inventoried. All books beyond usefulness are destroyed and others, save those in use are kept in reserve, apart from the school rooms. In making next years' appropriation for text books, provision should be made for this necessary shrinkage. For similar reasons, common pails and dippers as fast as practicable, are being replaced by stone water coolers and individual cups.

According to the April, 1912 census, there are 185 children between five and fifteen years, inclusive. An average attendance of only 108 out of 185, is a very deplorable record

village school is mainly responsible. Out of 58, only re registered, and the average attendance was only 23. Il return to this later. There is one encouraging feature he fact, that notwithstanding the disadvantages of atlance out of town, 12 scholars are attending High school. s for consideration of teachers, we now come to the heart ne whole matter. The success or failure of those pupils attend with any degree or regularity, depends after all greatly upon the teachers. Therefore, the endeavor ild ever be to engage those teachers, who take up the k as something more than a means of livelihood. The savor should be to engage those of inspiration and mental are, who have a facility of inspiring self-confidence and kening a zeal for learning in the pupils, and who take a tive delight in the development and expansion of young ds. These servitors, so vital to the enlightenment and ress of our community life and social standing, should ive the sympathy and hearty co-operation of not only parents immediately concerned, but the community as a le. Some of the teachers (a full list of them is given where in the Town Report) have labored faithfully, but or disadvantages of one kind or another, and so are deing of credit. It is a well deserved and fitting tribute the twelve scholars attending High school are from the Cove and North Districts; a tribute on the one hand to teachers for their earnest and capable service, and on other to the sympathy and support of the people of those icts, that makes possible a continued and constructive ce. May like conditions be extended in all the School icts. Contributory to that end a proposition will be ented at the Town meeting, for the purpose of avoiding usual interruptions, changes and delays between the ter and Spring terms.

I urge that all the schools, as far as possible, be graded. The accomplishment of such purpose will add greatly to the efficiency, and bring them up in line with other schools throughout the State.

There are two matters, concerning which, I feel to speak most earnestly, as by virtue of my office, they weigh heavily upon me. Not that they are the only matters that press for consideration; but all cannot be attended to at once, and these seem to be the most important and urgent. I refer in the first instance to truancy, and in the second to the inadequacy of the Village school. As regards truancy, I called attention to the fact that out of 58 children in the village, only 33 are registered, and the average attendance was only 23. That means that truaucy is much the predominant feature in the Village school. Other districts are affected in some measure, but the root of the difficulty lies here. There are families with a number of children in which no pretense of school attendance is made, and in several others only the merest pretense. It is a gross crime that a boy grow to be 15 years in this day, and in a civilized community, and he not be able to read and write. It is not one whit less heinous a crime to stunt their mental and moral possibilities, than it would be to brutally cleave off a hand, a foot, or one or more limbs. It is a heinous crime to deprive them of the possibilities of a worthy and noble manhood or womanhood, or even to deprive them of an equal chance to earn a livelihood.

Better twice over that they never be born, than that they be reduced to the serfdom of mere bread earners, without chance for any of the finer human traits and pursuits. What use is it to try to teach respect for the flag and inspire patriotic instincts, when in the homes and industries the truancy laws, our civil safeguards, which permit those

tincts to have any consistency, are ruthlessly and lawlessrampled under foot. The tendency of such is to make m double-minded and dissemblers, and to start them on way to become traitors of their countries welfare. Vain , under such conditions, to hope, as we sometimes fondlo, that some one of our boys, shall attain to the high e of the Presidency of these United States, or some other h office of trust and responsibility; one who would reflect or upon his native village, and of whom we could feel ly proud. But, my friends, before one can worthily icate themselves to the service of the nation, one must n to serve the welfare of the little community in which 7 live. Before one can administer grave affairs of state. must learn to be industrious the year around, Winter rell as Summer. Before one can inspire confidence and a nation, they must pass the primary, and learn respect sacred regard for others. My fellow citizens, the future are and hope of this Town of Robbinston, is wrapped up he lives and possibilities of our boys and girls. Can we rd to do less than give them an equal chance with the and girls of other towns and cities? Good intentions not suffice. Nothing less than the active co-operation ou all, can suffice. Lest anyone should chance to remain ess, provision should unfailingly be made for such emerw. when it comes to the election of truant officer.

s previously stated, there are 58 children in this village, m our government endows with the right, and of right ild have the privilege of school. It is a physical imposity for one teacher te do justice to such a number. The ige School building is in need of extensive repairs to e it a safe place for these children. For these reasons demand for a two room building and two teachers, is erative. It is an economy when making an appropria-

tion, to so provide for its expenditure, that the work need not soon be undone, but rather have lasting value. Nothing short of a two room building will meet the need. When this need has been met, and the sehool properly graded, a firm and substantial basis will have been made toward the aroposal made last year as regards a High School course. in the future the first year of a High School course could be taught in one of the rooms with the upper grades, and so no additional expense, save a raise in one of the teacher's salary, which would be largely, if not quite, met by a saving in tuition. At any rate, nothing less than a two room building and two teachers can with any show of justice cope with the existing needs. The trust and responsibility resting upon us for these young lives, is too sacred to either be treated lightly, or to admit of any selfish tampering. The duty is ours and with a little enterprise we can meet it if we will.

I thank you for the honor that you have conferred upon me in this brief appointment, and also the members of the School Committee for their co-operation in the work.






